Local Authorities driving the alternative energy revolution – renewables, energy efficiency and microgeneration

Date: Friday 18th November 2011

In August 2011 the UK Government published a 'White Paper on electricity market reforms' which will play a large part in the policy to develop a low carbon economy and assist in the mitigation of the effects of climate change. A passionate debate is currently taking place around the shape of how the UK energy market will look like over the next 30 years. The UK Government is suggesting a mix of renewables, nuclear power, energy efficiency and a small amount of microgeneration should play a leading role with existing and increased use of gas and a much reduced role for coal. Approval has been given by Somerset Councils for preliminary works at Hinkley Point awaiting a final sign-off of the proposed new nuclear reactor design in 2012. Some Local Authorities are working hard for nuclear to play a leading role in future energy policy. This though is set within an international sphere where countries like Germany, Switzerland, Denmark and Austria are pushing forward with future non-nuclear energy policies.

A lot of English Councils are developing energy provision without recourse to new nuclear, through an innovative variety of renewable energy projects, civic CHP schemes, demand management energy efficiency projects and supporting local companies in developing community-orientated microgeneration projects. Can such projects, with sufficient support, develop an 'alternative energy revolution' to fulfil the country's future energy needs and provide greater energy security? What potential do they have, and how important is Council leadership in developing this revolution? Can they assist in reducing fuel poverty?

This FREE seminar will consider these questions and showcase some Local Authority best practice examples. All NFLA member councils, interested non-member councillors and officers and interested local and national groups are very welcome to attend
