## **Nuclear Free Local Authorities (Scotland) call for local energy revolution.**

Nuclear Free Local Authorities (Scotland) welcomes much of what is in the UK Government's Low Carbon Transition Plan (1), particular the help for households to make energy savings. It also welcomes the Renewable Energy Strategy and the target of producing 30% of the UK's electricity from renewable sources by 2020; and 15% of the UK's heat requirements. (2)

However, NFLA Scotland calls on the UK Government to follow the Scottish Government's lead and drop its plans to facilitate the development of new nuclear reactors. This is diverting attention and resources away from the real solutions to climate change – energy efficiency and renewable energy.

A coalition of Scottish environment groups have published a study which demonstrates how Scotland can meet its climate change commitments without resorting to the construction of new nuclear reactors. (3) By combining increased development of renewable energy with an energy efficiency programme, the report shows how we can exceed annual electricity demand, even when a significant proportion of heating and transport demand are electrified.

This is good news for jobs because renewables and energy efficiency programmes are so much better at creating jobs than nuclear power. Central to such a strategy is the need to bring all existing housing up to a high standard of insulation, with a big role for small-scale decentralised energy production.

NFLA (Scotland) Vice Convener, Councillor Audrey Doig said:-

*“Scottish Councils have a crucial role to play in the local energy revolution, and are keen to get on with implementing it. But in 2003 we were promised a step change in energy efficiency – we are still waiting. We cannot afford to wait another six years while the Government ‘facilitates new nuclear reactors’ and tries to work out how to unlock greater action by local authorities”.* (4)

NFLA Scotland fears that by placing so much attention of reviving the nuclear industry, the UK Government is distracting attention and resources from some of the excellent ideas in the Low Carbon Transition Plan.

Councillor Doig adds:

*“Scottish Councils would far rather be helping to provide our citizens with warm, cheap to run homes than be asked to volunteer sites for nuclear waste dumps as is happening south of the border, but we need resources to do it”.*
